**Warning Letter Re: FPPC No. 12/0041; Merced County Deputy Sheriff's Association PAC;
Michael Harris, Treasurer**

Dear Mr. Harris:

The Fair Political Practices Commission ("FPPC") enforces the provisions of the Political Reform Act ("Act"),¹ found in Government Code section 81000, et seq. This letter is in response to a referral from the Secretary of State that alleged you failed to file your committee's semiannual campaign disclosure statements.

The FPPC has completed its investigation of the facts in this case. Specifically, the FPPC found that you failed to file semiannual campaign statements on time for the following period(s):

- January 1, 2011 through June 30, 2011 (Due July 31, 2011)
- July 1, 2011 through December 30, 2011 (Due January 31, 2012)

Section 84200 of the Act provides that elected officers, candidates, and committees shall file semiannual campaign statements.

Your actions violated the Act because you failed to file the aforementioned campaign statement(s) by the specified deadlines. However, since your committee does not have an enforcement history and you filed the semi-annual campaign statements on February 8, 2012, we are closing your case with this warning letter. The information in this matter will be retained and may be considered should an enforcement action become necessary based on newly discovered information or future conduct. Failure to comply with the provisions of the Act in the future will result in monetary penalties of up to \$5,000 for each violation.

Although the FPPC is not seeking a penalty in the current matter, you are still required to immediately file all outstanding statements with the Secretary of State and continue filing them

until you officially terminate your committee. You will be responsible for any late filing fees assessed by your filing officer. (§ 91013.)

If your committee is no longer active, you may want to terminate your committee at this time as well. Failure to do so is a violation of the Act. Please be advised that after every filing deadline, your local filing officer will refer all non-filers to the Enforcement Division. Any future failure to file your campaign statements will automatically be brought to our attention.

A warning letter is an FPPC case resolution without administrative prosecution or fine. However, the warning letter resolution does not provide you with the opportunity for a probable cause hearing or hearing before an Administrative Law Judge or the Fair Political Practices Commission. If you wish to avail yourself of these proceedings by requesting that your case proceed with prosecution rather than a warning, please notify us within ten (10) days from the date of this letter. Upon this notification, the FPPC will rescind this warning letter and proceed with administrative prosecution of this case. If we do not receive such notification, this warning letter will be posted on the FPPC's website ten (10) days from the date of this letter.
