**Re: Advisory Letter
FPPC Case No. 06/710; Chuck Reed**

Dear Mr. Reed:

The Fair Political Practices Commission ("Commission") enforces the provisions of the Political Reform Act (the "Act")¹. As you may be aware, the Commission received a complaint against you alleging violations of the conflict of interest provisions of the Act. Specifically, the complaint alleges that you made and participated in making governmental decisions that had a reasonably foreseeable material financial effect on your business and the clients of your business while serving as a city councilmember on the San Jose City Council during 2003 and 2005. The Commission has decided to close this case with this advisory letter.

Under the Act, no public official at any level of state or local government may make, participate in making, or in any way use or attempt to use her official position to influence a governmental decision in which she knows or has reason to know she has a disqualifying conflict of interest. (Section 87100.) To determine whether an individual has a disqualifying conflict of interest, the Commission generally employs the following sequenced analysis: (1) is the individual a public official; (2) did the official make, participate in making, or use or attempt to use the official position to influence a governmental decision; (3) what are the official's economic interests, (4) are the official's economic interests directly or indirectly involved in the governmental decision; (5) what is the applicable materiality standard for each economic interest involved; and (6) is it reasonably foreseeable that the governmental decision will have a material financial effect on the official's economic interest.² (See Regulation 18700.)

² The additional two steps of the analysis - whether the public generally exception applies and whether the individual is legally required to participate in the governmental decision - are inapplicable to this matter.

As a city councilmember in 2003 and 2005, you were a public official under the Act. (Sections 82048 and 87200.) By voting and participating in discussions during city council meetings during this time, you made and participated in making governmental decisions. According to our limited investigation, you had multiple economic interests during this time period including being partial owner and employee for Reed & Roth, Inc., a law firm. In this matter, the allegations in the complaint turn on whether it is reasonably foreseeable that a material financial effect on your economic interests would result from your votes and participation in discussions regarding certain governmental decisions.

City council minutes show that you voted and participated in discussions on May 13, 2003, to direct the city attorney to draft an ordinance to change current law regarding the sale of alcoholic beverages in certain circumstances, which would potentially impact businesses like min-marts and gas stations. Additionally, September 16, 2003, you voted and participated in discussions regarding some revisions to this proposed ordinance. And June 14, 2005, you voted and participated in discussions regarding the final revisions to the ordinance before the adoption votes. During the two adoption votes, according to the minutes, you recused yourself stating that you had a client that may seek to establish a mini-mart if the ordinance passed. Based on our limited investigation into these matters, there is insufficient evidence to establish that the financial effects of the governmental decisions you made and participated in making would cause a reasonably foreseeable material financial effect on your economic interests given the particular nature of the decisions. Therefore, we have decided to close this case with this advisory letter.

Even though we are closing our file on this matter, please be advised of the conflict of interest provisions of the Act (Sections 87100 and following.) in future decisions that you may make as a public official. The Commission publishes forms and manuals to facilitate compliance with the provisions of the Act and provides guidance regarding filing obligations over the telephone and through written advice.
