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I. ENFORCEMENT DIVISION

STAFF: JAMES M. LINDSAY, CHIEF OF ENFORCEMENT

A. Overview

During the period of September 1, 2023 through September 30, 2023 the Enforcement Division received the following complaints and referrals:

When compared to the Annual Statistics chart in Section B, the number of complaints was standard for a non-election year, but the number of referrals was significantly higher than normal. For the month of September, more time to respond beyond the 14-day statutory period was needed for 4¹ sworn complaints.

Additionally, the Enforcement Division opened 66 cases from complaints and referrals received, rejected 142 complaints and referrals, and closed a total of 114 cases including:

- 82 warning letters advertisement violations (7), campaign violations (17), lobbying reporting violation (1), statement of economic interests violations (56), and unlawful honorarium violation (1);
- 2 no action closure letters: PREP completed statement of economic interests violations;
- 14 no action closure letters alleging advertisement violations (3), campaign violations (4), conflict of interest violations (4), lobbying reporting violation (1), and statement of economic interests violations (2);
- 6 approved stipulations from the August and September Commission meetings;
- 2 advisory letters;
- 7 committees were administratively terminated; and
- 1 closed as a duplicate.

The Division had 1,191 cases in various stages of resolution at the time of the September Monthly Report and currently has approximately 1,143 cases in various stages of resolution, including the 9 cases before the Commission as listed in the October Agenda (2 for mainline consideration and 7 streamline listed in the Executive Staff Report).

E. Unexecuted Streamline Stipulations

Streamline penalty stipulations are approved by the Chief of Enforcement and reported to the Commission for discussion only before they are executed. The following streamline stipulations are presented for that purpose. After the close of the hearing, the Chief of Enforcement may execute all or any of the streamline penalty stipulations, at the Chief's discretion per Regulation 18360.2.

Since the last Monthly Report, the Enforcement Chief has not used discretion to increase the penalties for Tier Two advertising violations resulting in public confusion, under Regulation 18360.3(d)(7)(B)(i)(b), or to increase the penalties for Tier Two violations involving the same candidate, committee, or principal officer who has paid a Tier One penalty to the Commission or received a Warning Letter from the Commission for the same type of violation occurring within the last five years, based on the resulting public harm.

The Enforcement Chief used discretion under Regulations 18360.1 and 18360.3 to exclude violations in the following streamline cases presented with this report: In the Matter of Friends of Caleen Sisk Assembly District 1 - 2018, Caleen Sisk, and April Carmelo; FPPC No. 19/061 [The Chief of Enforcement may include or exclude any filer from receiving a Tier Two streamline penalty based upon mitigating or aggravating circumstances and the totality of the circumstances, including situations where an exclusion may apply.]; In the Matter of No on Prop 22, sponsored by Labor Organizations and Art Pulaski; FPPC No. 23/445 [The Chief of Enforcement may include or exclude any filer from receiving a Tier Two streamline penalty based upon mitigating or aggravating circumstances and the totality of the circumstances, including situations where an exclusion may apply.]; In the Matter of No on Prop 22, sponsored by Labor Organizations and Art Pulaski; FPPC No. 23/445 [The Chief of Enforcement may include or exclude any filer from receiving a Tier Two streamline penalty based upon mitigating or aggravating circumstances and the totality of the circumstances, including situations where an exclusion may apply.]; In the Matter of County of Humboldt;

FPPC No. 20/434 [The Chief of Enforcement may include or exclude any filer from receiving a Tier Two streamline penalty based upon mitigating or aggravating circumstances and the totality of the circumstances, including situations where an exclusion may apply.]; In the Matter of Alcantar for City Council 2018, Elizabeth Alcantar, and Oscar Moreno; FPPC No. 18/1142 [The Chief of Enforcement may include or exclude any filer from receiving a streamline penalty based upon mitigating or aggravating circumstances and the totality of the circumstances, including situations where an exclusion may apply.] Here, in the interest of settlement, six counts of failing to timely file semi-annual campaign statements (84200) and one count of failing to timely file a statement of economic interests (87203) have been excluded; In the Matter of Christine Salazar for School Board 2020 and Christine Salazar; FPPC No. 20/959 [The Chief of Enforcement may include or exclude any filer from receiving a streamline penalty based upon mitigating or aggravating circumstances, including situations where an exclusion may apply.] Here, in the interest of School Board 2020 and Christine Salazar; FPPC No. 20/959 [The Chief of Enforcement may include or exclude any filer from receiving a streamline penalty based upon mitigating or aggravating circumstances and the totality of the circumstances, including situations where an exclusion may apply.]

Recordkeeping

In the Matter of Caleen Sisk, Friends of Caleen Sisk Assembly District 1 - 2018, and April Carmelo; FPPC No. 19/061. Staff: Jenna C. Rinehart, Commission Counsel and Katelin Angeloni, Special Investigator. Caleen Sisk was a successful candidate for District 1 State Assembly in the June 5, 2018 Primary Election but was defeated in the November 6, 2018 General Election. Friends of Caleen Sisk Assembly District 1 – 2018 was Sisk's controlled committee. April Carmelo served as the Committee's treasurer. Sisk, Carmelo, and the Committee failed to timely file two pre-election campaign statements, in violation of Government Code Section 84200.5 (2 counts). Additionally, Sisk, Carmelo, and the Committee failed to timely file four 24-hour contribution reports, in violation of Government Code Section 84104 (5 counts). Total Penalty: \$3,463 (Tier One).

Advertisements

In the Matter of No on Prop 22, sponsored by Labor Organizations, Art Pulaski; FPPC No. 23/445. Staff: Alex Rose, Commission Counsel and Lance Hachigian, Special Investigator. The respondents are represented by Kelly Liang of Olson Remcho. No on Prop 22, sponsored by Labor Organizations was a local primarily formed committee. Art Pulaski was the Committee's treasurer. The Committee and Pulaski failed to include the proper advertising disclosures on two flyers distributed prior to the November 3, 2020 General Election, in violation of Government Code Sections 84502 and 84503 (2 counts). Total Penalty: \$844 (Tier Two).

Lobbying Reporting

In the Matter of County of Humboldt; FPPC No. 20/434. Staff: Theresa Gilbertson, Senior Commission Counsel. County of Humboldt, a lobbyist employer, failed to timely file eight lobbyist employer quarterly reports, in violation of Government Code Section 86116 (8 counts). Total Penalty \$9,546 (Tier Two).

In the Matter of Cobalt Institute; FPPC No. 23/252. Staff: James M. Lindsay, Chief of Enforcement and Ginny Brown, Political Reform Consultant. The respondent is represented by Gary S. Winuk of Kaufman Legal Group. Cobalt Institute, a lobbyist employer, failed to timely file four lobbyist employer quarterly reports, in violation of Government Code Section 86116 (4 counts). Total Penalty: \$1,392 (Tier One).

Campaign Late Filer

In the Matter of Elizabeth Alcantar, Alcantar for City Council 2018, and Oscar Moreno; FPPC No. 18/1142. Staff: Jenna C. Rinehart, Commission Counsel and Roone Petersen, Special Investigator. The respondents were represented by Latrice Burks of Larson LLP. Elizabeth Alcantar was a successful candidate for Cudahy City Council in the November 6, 2018 General Election. Alcantar for City Council 2018 is Alcantar's controlled committee. Oscar Moreno serves as the Committee's treasurer. Alcantar failed to timely file a statement of intention prior to the solicitation or receipt of any contributions or loans, in violation of Government Code Section 85200 (1 count). The Committee failed to timely file an amendment to its statement of organization to disclose its date of qualification, in violation of Government Code Section 84103 (1 count). Additionally, the Committee failed to timely file a 24-hour contribution report and three semi-annual campaign statements, in violation of Government Code Sections 84203 and 84200 (4 counts). Lastly, as a City Council member, Alcantar failed to timely file the 2019 and 2020 Annual SEIs, in violation of Government Code Section 87203 (2 counts). Total Penalty: \$7,327 (Tiers One & Two).

In the Matter of Christine Salazar for School Board 2020; Christine Salazar; FPPC No. 20/959. Staff: Alex Rose, Commission Counsel. Christine Salazar was a successful candidate for Hacienda La Puente School Board in the November 3, 2020 General Election. Christine Salazar for School Board 2020 was Salazar's candidate-controlled committee. The Committee and Salazar failed to timely file six semi-annual campaign statements and one 24-hour contribution report, in violation of Government Code Sections 84200 and 84203 (7 counts). Total Penalty: \$1,692 (Tier One).

Statement of Economic Interests Late Filer

In the Matter of Vincent Andreotti; FPPC No. 23/521. Staff: James M. Lindsay, Chief of Enforcement and Amber Rodriguez, Political Reform Consultant. Vincent Andreotti, a Member for the Rice Commission, failed to timely file a 2020 Annual Statement of Economic Interests, in violation of Government Code Section 87300 (1 count). Total Penalty: \$800 (Tier Two).

II. AUDIT DIVISION

STAFF: SHRDHA SHAH, CHIEF OF AUDITS

Audits are conducted per Government Code sections 90000 - 90008 of the Political Reform Act (the Act). The Act requires full disclosure of receipts and expenditures of candidates and committees and disclosure of the finances of lobbyists. The purpose of the audits is to determine the level of compliance of the auditees with the Act. The opinions expressed in the audit report reflect the level of compliance with the Act. The FPPC is not responsible for the contents of the candidate's documents. Audit reports are then submitted to the Enforcement Division for further review.

A. Overview

The audit reports prepared by the FPPC summarize findings with respect to the filer's conformity with the disclosure and recordkeeping requirements of the Political Reform Act. Copies of audit reports are always sent to the auditees and those included in the audit report (such as the prior treasurer, current treasurer, and/or their representatives). These reports are public documents.

B. Current Period Updates

During the period of September1, 2023, through September 30, 2023, the Audits and Assistance Division adopted 2 audit reports, both with no findings. Currently, the team has 34 audits in progress at various stages, including fieldwork, post-fieldwork, and quality review.

D. Political Reform Education Program (PREP):

In September, PREP received 14 referrals for the Statement of Economic Interests course. During this time, 8 learners completed PREP, 3 learners failed to complete PREP, and 18 learners are enrolled but have not yet completed the course.

In September, the Legal Division responded to the following requests for advice:

- *Education*: The Education unit responded to 310 requests for technical assistance via telephone.
- *Requests for Advice:* Political Reform Consultants and Legal Division attorneys collectively responded to 460 email requests for advice, 140 of which were not responded to within 24 hours and 60 of those were not responded to within 48 hours.
- *Advice Letters:* The Legal Division received 8 advice letter requests under the Political Reform Act and completed 6.
- Section 1090 Letters: The Legal Division received 7 advice letter request concerning Section 1090 and completed 5. This year to date, we have received 53 advice requests regarding Section 1090.

- Lobbying of CA Citizens Redistricting Commission Clarify in regulation that attempting to influence members of the California Citizens Redistricting Commission can qualify as "lobbying" under the Act. (Adoption)
- Contributions to candidates not appearing in a general election Adopt a regulation detailing what a candidate-controlled committee may do with contributions for a general election when the candidate withdraws from the primary election or wins in the primary such that no general election is held. (Adoption)
