


Information Related to Measure Q:

- Measure Q would require voter approval, through December 31, 2050, of General Plan amendments of agricultural land (Agricultural, Rangeland or Rural designations) to other types of land uses. This would result in more voter involvement with the General Plan amendment process.⁹ Measure Q also removes four existing "Commercial Regional Nodes" (zones) and nine "Commercial Thoroughfare Nodes" (zones) from the General Plan.
- Measure Q would impose the voter requirement to <u>all</u> applicable General Plan amendments. The process would be the same whether the General Plan amendment is sought for residential development (such as market rate housing) or for commercial or industrial development. If the Board approves the urgency ordinance on 9/27/22, and thereafter modifies the General Plan to prohibit or restrict residential development in the New Community Study Areas, Measure Q's impact would mostly impact future commercial/industrial development in these areas.

- Voter approval required by Measure Q would occur after completion of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) process and after the County's processing and approval of an applicable General Plan amendment.
- As a result, Measure Q would result in a process that will take longer and which will add risk to potential investors, which may discourage such investment.¹⁰
 Therefore, San Benito County could lose certain economic development opportunities—such as new business coming to the unincorporated area of the County—to surrounding counties or to the City of Hollister.¹¹
 Development in the City of Hollister does not provide anywhere near the same degree of revenue to the County of San Benito, reducing County of San Benito's ability to provide infrastructure and services to County residents.

FISCAL IMPACT

The 9111 report and the Auditor's Fiscal Analysis should be consulted for a full analysis of the fiscal impacts of Measure Q.¹² The Auditor's fiscal analysis indicates that if Measure Q is passed and without voter approval of future General Plan amendments, the County could lose \$6.56 million



annually by the year 2035 that the County could obtain if the commercial nodes (zones) were developed.

We live in a wonderful County.
It is a small, safe community, and is a great place to live and work. The goal of County government is to provide the best possible community for our residents by providing infrastructure and services, including public safety.
Below is some information for your consideration.

Facts Regarding San Benito County:

- 1. County Revenue. San Benito
 County, as a governmental entity,
 is one of the poorest funded in the
 state and among the lowest 15 of
 58 counties on a per person basis.²
 San Benito County receives, on
 average, only 11 cents of every dollar
 collected in property taxes.³ Our
 County spends its finite revenues on
 multiple competing needs—fixing
 roads, streets, and highways; public
 safety; social services; maintaining our
 County library and parks; and more.
- 2. Jobs-Housing Imbalance.
 San Benito County suffers from a significant jobs-housing imbalance.
 55% of residents travel outside the County with an average commute of over 30 minutes. This jobs-housing imbalance contributes to traffic on nearby highways 25, 156 and 152, and main thoroughfares like Fairview, San Felipe, and Shore Road.
- 3. Road Conditions. Our network of roads is deteriorating under the weight of decades of underinvestment. Our road conditions are significantly worse than the statewide average. Measure G (the 1% sales tax enacted in 2018), state funding and traffic impact fees

- are helping, but are not sufficient to cover the rising costs of all needed road improvements. The County still needs additional revenue to bring its 449.71 miles of County roads up to a good condition.
- 4. Residential Growth. Between 2015 and 2021, the City of Hollister added 1,891 housing units. The County of San Benito added less than half this amount—898 housing units.8 Measure Q does not affect land use decisions within the Cities of Hollister or San Juan Bautista. Measure Q only applies to General Plan amendments involving agricultural land within the unincorporated area of the County.
- 5. Commercial and Industrial
 Development. There has not been significant commercial or industrial development in the unincorporated county. Because Measure Q removes 13 commercial nodes and would apply to future commercial and industrial general plan amendments, it likely will have a significant impact on future commercial and industrial development in the County.
- 6. Financial Impact of
 Development. Depending on
 the size and type of the project,
 commercial and industrial
 development can increase local jobs
 and local revenue which can then
 assist in providing services and fixing
 infrastructure. Residential growth
 does not provide the same financial
 benefits to the County.
- 7. Recent Board of Supervisors
 Action. On September 13, 2022,
 the Board of Supervisors adopted
 a resolution to initiate a General
 Plan amendment, per the motion,
 to eliminate the New Community
 Study Areas in the General Plan, and
 directed that an urgency item be
 brought to the September 27, 2022
 Board meeting, to prohibit or restrict
 residential development in all four
 new Community Study Areas while
 the General Plan amendment process
 is underway.
