Dear Ms. Quan:

You have been authorized by Sheriff Plummer to request advice concerning his reporting requirements under the Political Reform Act (the "Act").<sup>1/</sup>

## QUESTION

Are travel expenses and per diem received from a nonprofit, tax-exempt educational and charitable organization considered a gift for purposes of the Act?

## CONCLUSION

Reimbursement for travel expenses and per diem received from a bona fide educational, academic or charitable organization is not a gift within the meaning of the Act if the recipient provided consideration of equal or greater value to the organization.

## FACTS

Sheriff Plummer attended a law enforcement mission to Israel sponsored and financed by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith (the "League"). Sheriff Plummer and nine other top law enforcement officers from the United States participated with Israeli Police in a program to share ideas on a variety of law

enforcement matters, including issues relating to counter-terrorism. Sheriff Plummer's travel and per diem were paid for by the League, and the value of those costs was approximately \$2,500.

Sheriff Plummer and the others in the group met daily with officials of various police agencies, both civilian and military, to discuss terrorism, demonstrations and other actions in which the police become involved. They discussed police problems unique to various sights viewed (for example, airports.) Sheriff Plummer analyzed police functions, and discussed how to handle specific situations requiring police response, including rock-throwing. He gave input as a law enforcement expert with 30 years' experience, including his experience with rock-throwing and demonstrations involving the People's Park in Berkeley. He also gained information with respect to the control and monitoring of terrorist activities.

The Anti-Defamation League is qualified as an educational and charitable organization by the IRS, qualifying under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The League's goal is to educate Americans about Israel; promote better interfaith and intergroup relations; counteract anti-democratic extremism and strengthen democratic values and structures. The League maintains speakers' bureaus and has several publications relating to law, human rights, interreligious concerns and other topics.

#### ANALYSIS

Section 82030 (a) defines "income," in part, as any "gift, including any gift of food or beverage...." Section 82030 (b) lists the following exception to "income":

(2) Salary and reimbursement for expenses or per diem received from a state, local, or federal government agency and reimbursement for travel expenses and per diem received from a bona fide educational, academic, or charitable organization.

(Emphasis added.)

Section 82028 defines "gift" as follows:

(a) "Gift" means, except as provided in subdivision (b), any payment to the extent that consideration of equal or greater value is not received....

Subdivision (b) of Section 82028 contains six exceptions to the definition of "gift," however an exception for gifts of travel and per diem from bona fide charitable, educational or academic organizations is not included.

Based on the language of Sections 82028 and 82030, the exclusion for travel expenses and per diem received from a bona fide educational, academic, or charitable organization set forth in Section 82030 is intended to apply to payments made for consideration and not to gifts. When determining whether or not an official has received a gift, the only exclusions which apply are those set forth in the exceptions to gift in Section 82028(b). (Riddle Advice Letter, No. A-89-200, copy enclosed.)

Under the above interpretation, the burden would shift to Sheriff Plummer to show that he provided consideration of equal or greater value. If he does not meet this burden of proof, the League's payment of his travel expenses and per diem will constitute a gift. Section 85400 states that an elected officerholder may not receive a gift in excess of \$1,000.

If Sheriff Plummer has received a gift, he may reimburse the League for all or a portion of the gift. In that case, the value of the gift will be reduced by the amount of reimbursement. (Regulation 18726.1(b), copy enclosed.) The regulation requires that reimbursement occur within 30 days of the date of receipt of the gift. However, we do not believe that it would be equitable to enforce the 30-day rule in this case since your request for advice was made during the 30-day period. Therefore, if the travel was a gift, and Sheriff Plummer reimburses the League within 15 days of the date of this letter, we would consider the reimbursement to be timely.

Dear Mr. Hickling:

This will confirm that Sheriff Plummer is not required to reimburse the Anti-Defamation League for travel and per diem relating to the trip to Israel that is in excess of \$1,000. Because of clarifications by the Commission at its June 6th meeting, we are now advising that the \$1,000 limitation contained in Government Code Section 85400 applies only to payments made for a speech, article or published work related to the governmental process, excluding actual travel expenses and reasonable subsistence directly in connection therewith.

There is still an issue regarding whether or not the sheriff will be required to report the reimbursement for travel and per diem as a gift on his statement of economic interest. That issue will be presented to the Commission at its meeting on July 12, 1989.
